### Jubilee Dinner 2007

Though most details are not confirmed, it will be good for us to do a preview here for your interests and planning.

The dinner will be held at the Grand Hall of Hong Kong Exhibition & Convention Centre on Saturday, December 8, 2007. It is going to be a joint dinner celebrating the 75th anniversary of La Salle College and the 50th anniversary of La Salle Primary School. It will be a western dinner and we expect an attendance of over 2,000 guests.

The theme is not yet fixed but we shall surely go along the direction of a homely gathering, where all from various parts of the La Salle community in Hong Kong, old or young, come together for a relaxing, enjoyable and memorable reunion. As usual, the night will be filled with performances, games and lucky draw but rest assured that we will reserve a lot of free-time for you to mingle, chat and take photos with boys of different years. All programmes will be done by our own La Salle boys and staff.

At the maximum, the Grand Hall of HKCEC can accommodate 195 tables of 12. For a celebration of two schools, coupled with an expected high turn-up rate of our overseas old boys due to Global Reunion 2007 held in Hong Kong, over-booking is anticipated. We shall monitor closely the booking situation and if demand much exceeds our capacity, we may have to say no to late bookers or to put them to the extra tables in the Reception Area right outside the Hall.

While the mechanism and starting date of reservation are not confirmed, it is quite possible that a detailed announcement on such be made latest by end of July. Once the booking details are available, please send in your Booking Form with payment. The cover price is not fixed but it will probably be higher than the LSCOBA Christmas Dinner 2006 (HK\$998).

### **HEALTH TALK at 7:00pm on Thursday 29 March 2007**



About 24 old boys and family members attended the Health Talk organized by the LSCOBA Professional Network Committee in Room 107 at La Salle College. Mr Antony Pang (1988), a registered Social Worker in Hong Kong with more than 13 years of youth work experience, spoke on the topic of "From Stress to Preferred Identity of Adolescence" and shared his interesting experience of outreaching to problematic youths in Tin Shui Wai. He emphasized the need to "listen" to the youths in order to gain their trust.

Dr Ng Wai Man, Stephen (1985), a Specialist in Psychiatry in private practice, explained to the audience how to recognize mood problems in everyday life. Many expressed that they exhibited symptoms of the disorders as mentioned by Stephen and were concerned about their

mental health. Stephen then comforted everybody that only when the symptoms fulfilled many conditions that the person would be considered as suffering from the disorders.



# Professional Network Round Table Dinner

The LSCOBA professional network final gathering of the

2006/07 term was held on Friday 1 June 2007 at the World Trade Centre Club in Causeway Bay. There were 40 old boys and 24 current students attending the Round Table Dinner. Mr Paul CHENG Ming Fun鄭明訓 (1954) shared his views on "Social responsibilities of the Corporate Citizen and of the Ordinary Citizen" whilst Mr Peter WONG Tung Shun王冬勝 (1970) painted a rosy picture for our youths in his topic of "Hong Kong Banking in the Next 5 Years". Both speakers were treating everyone as fellow LaSallian brothers and were very open and candid in their speech. Their experience in dealing with, and treating, people was poignantly conveyed to the audience.

### **Factory Visit**

The visit to Esquel's factory was held on an overcast and humid Thursday 24 May 2007. The group audience. assembled at 7:30am at the China Hong Kong Ferry Terminal and took the 8:20am ferry where a lot chatting took place. We arrived at the factory at 11:30am. Our host provided a buffet lunch and explained the vertically integrated textile and garment production. Our LSCOBA Vice President Mr. Charles Chan presented souvenirs to Esquel's Vice President Mr. J G Cheng. A group photo was taken before the factory tour. We saw the whole process of cotton to yarn, to fabric, to CAD cutting, to sewing, to packaging; except one process which was classified. We were advised not to take photos during the tour but that did not deter our eager participants from asking many questions. The group bid farewell to Esquel's staff at the ferry pier and

took the 3:30pm ferry to Hong Kong. There were 9 people who stayed behind in the China Hong Kong Ferry Terminal for dinner. Mr. Henry Law (1980) enchanted the dinner group with his vivid presentation of the enneagram principles until 10pm.



### Oxfam Trailwalker Japan 2007/5/18-20

On a sunny 18 May morning, 4 itchy Hong Kong Feet (Wallace Leung (96), Alvis Chan (96), Tom Wong and I) gathered

together with other 700+ 'Genki'(元気) (healthy) participants in Odawara (小田原). We were all ready to finish the first ever Oxfam Trailwalker held in Japan - arguably the most difficult 100km trail amongst all the Oxfam trailwalker routes in the world - within 48 hours. However, there were not any nervous or concerned expressions on our faces because we all knew that the challenge ahead was just tiny compared to the world poverty Oxfam is fighting against. Following an encouraging opening speech from Mr. Chong, Chan-Yau, the executive director of Oxfam, we all marched through the starting point with accompanies from the unique cheering teams – Japanese Drums and Japanese Shoguns.

The first 20km walk was smooth and nice. The large platoon of fresh trailwalkers streamed through small villages and mountain under the sunshine heading for the next checkpoint. When we arrived each checkpoint we were greeted by a large group of volunteers who duly prepared all food, drinks and energy supplement ready for our consumption.

The problem started to emerge after we passed the 2nd checkpoint. One of our teammates Wallace had pulled his knee ligaments and he had problems walking downhill. Ironically, another teammate Tom started to develop a severe headache whenever he walked uphill. We struggled to arrive at checkpoint 3 where our support team met us the first time there.



We had a discussion and eventually we decided that we would try heading to checkpoint 4 first since there would be better supporting facilities there. It was a long and hard 15km journey. We gave encouragement and support to Tom when going uphill and to Wallace when going downhill. We were struggling and very slow compared to other teams. However I could strongly sense the determination of our teammates from every footstep they made. The Hong Kong Foot kept on progressing to checkpoint 4 slow and steady.

After more than 5hrs of walk we finally arrived at the checkpoint in the evening. The word 'Exhausted' were printed on everyone's face. We had our light supper there and volunteers there kindly provided us stretching service even though our legs were dirty and smelly. At this point Tom was too sick to continue and we had to continue as a team of 3. It was definitely the low point of our team but the news that Wallace's knee felt better after wearing a kneepad did serve as a booster.

It was 22:45 when we continued our excursion to checkpoint 5. We had to walk pass the steepest part of the whole trail during the night. Local weather forecast stated that there would be heavy rain and thunderstorm starting from midnight (in Japan weather forecast is accurate most of the time). Every departing team had their rain gear on before they entered the mountain. The officials were recording every team number before they went up the trail. The atmosphere was tense and we knew that we needed to walk as quick as we could before the rain poured down in order to avoid the slippery and muddy trail.

It was very misty throughout the walk and we could only see few steps in front of us when we squeezed past the cliffs. However, the God was blessing us all the way through and we cruised to Checkpoint 5 safely with slight shower. We did not let the momentum slow down and we immediately continued our downhill journey to Checkpoint 6.

Downhill journey – sounded like a piece of cake but actually it was not as we could tell from Wallace's facial expression. At that point I wondered if we needed to give up our challenge as we could not walk as a team of 2 according to Oxfam's rule of safety. However, I suddenly felt a strong sense of Lasallian Spirit revolving around our team, especially when I received a firm 'No Problem' reply from Wallace every time we asked him. 'Never say die', 'Be calm and Do your best'. Alvis was showing another important Lasallian attribute - caring and support - to the team even though we all struggled to keep our eyes open after a whole night walk. We made our way to Checkpoint 6 in the morning and our ever thoughtful support team had already prepared us with fried rice breakfast and mattress.

The varying weather came as we were taking a rest at Checkpoint 6. Thunderstorm came, then rain, sunny, and then back to thunderstorm. With such a twisting weather, we departed the checkpoint with our full plastic rain gear on while the sun was shining warm and bright. The way to Checkpoint 7 was relatively smooth. With extra wrapping of medical bandages, Wallace managed to walk more comfortably. We were able to spare a few seconds to admire the beautiful rice fields with the spectacular

Mt. Fuji in the background. When we arrived at checkpoint 7 we were greeted by an enormous group of Oxfam support crew. The Hong Kong feet were extremely tired but we knew that we were getting there – only 25km to go!

After another round of professional stretching service from the Oxfam volunteers, we switched back to full gear mode and proceeded with our journey. Up to this point we had almost tried out every brand of energy jellies and power bars available in Tokyo. Although we were knackered we had extra motivation to walk quickly – we wanted to catch the last coach of the night home or else we would be stuck in the mountain for another night! With this special 'spirit' in mind, we conquered through another 4 peaks in record speed. On 19 Sat evening, the Hong Kong Feet proudly crossed the finishing line hand-in-hand with a time of 35hr 13min.

We did not finish at the best time of all but I was very glad that after almost 10 years graduation from the school we all still preserve the Lasallian spirit to do our best and fight till the last. We truly felt the warmth support from our fellow Lasallians from different years, different places - for your every email and sponsorship to our team. I strongly encourage we, the Lasallians, take up the social responsibility and be always accounted and ready to help others. Let us follow the good work of St. John Baptist de La Salle and show our love and care to people around us!



# Bringing the LSC Old School Building Back to Life!

I reckon all the Old Boys of the 80's and earlier will still have fond memories of the old school building of the La Salle College that was built in 1932:

- The front wing, with the Dome, which was built mainly with stone & granite:
- The major part of the school building, the rear wings and the inter-connecting walkways/footbridges, were of brick, cement, stone and wood;
- It was located on a small hill, surrounded by slopes, trees and greens;
- The football field (a.k.a. the "desert") where Annual Sports Galas, the PE lessons and the summer Astronomy sky observation sessions took place;
- The 70 steps to Boundary Street; and
- Many more......

The old building was eventually demolished in 1979, witnessed by many OBs, to make way for the new building, which is being used up to today.



A tendering process was carried out and a professional model maker was engaged for this work. This model maker has a proven track record of making professional building models for real estate developers and government projects and we are confident on their professionalism and workmanship. The final decision is that this model will be constructed in a scale of 1:150 and will incorporate also the football field, landscape areas & part of the surroundings. The finished product will be roughly of the size 2m x 3m.

All preparation is done and final artwork and drawings approved. The model is now under construction and will be available in summer. It will be displayed in the school premise after completion.

As different from past years' arrangement, all students took part as interviewees in mock group interviews conducted by the old boys (forming 10 interview panels). After each interview session, the old boys evaluated with the students their performance and advised them on how to improve at the real interviews. There were also discussion on career prospects and the undergrad old boys shared their admission interview and study experience with the students.

### Old School Badge Comes Back to Life

Old boys from the 1950s and 60s may remember a school blazer badge that is slightly different from what is used today. The Heritage Subcommittee set out to find this old badge, and we discovered Nicholas Ng (63), a Past President of the OBA, possessed one such article.

Holding onto the old badge, the team set off to find an experienced craftsman who can recreate the badge for us. This was not easy as the art of hand making such articles was dying. We were then referred to a Shanghainese gentleman, aged over eighty, and we asked if he can redo this badge for us.

Without much fanfare, he said in his heavy native accent, "I've done this badge before." We were surprised and delighted. The gentlemen then pulled out an old candy-tin turned storage box and began to flip through some old plastic badge outlines, and before long, he found the slide of that very badge, again uneventfully saying "See?".

When asked if he would reproduce the badge for us, he was doubtful whether we were serious, because it would cost a few hundred dollars (HK) and he didn't want to do a one-off effort as it would take considerable time and effort. We said we are dead serious, a few hundred dollars was no



issue, and we would do many more if the first one turned out well. He reluctantly agreed, while still muttering it would cost a few hundred dollars....

After a few weeks, the new old badge turned out to be a stunning beauty. We auctioned this very first badge beautifully framed at the OBA Christmas Dinner, old boy Nelson H. Lee (58)

becoming the highest bidder.

Subsequently, the OBA Committee decided to use the badge on a tailor-made blazer, and we wore it at the 75th Anniversary open day parade. A bulk order of thirty more badges was placed. - Late 1970s version of the Athletics Team Tracksuit


All items can either be loaned or donated to the school. Photos can be loaned, where they will be scanned, and returned, providing a high quality soft copy to owner if required.
