Our hearts are with the earthquake victims and the Committee members have come together in their own capacity to make a donation. The Association wishes to take this opportunity to call on all Old Boys to contribute generously to the relief efforts and direct their donations to the many channels in Hong Kong which are running donation drives for the victims.

My first term as the President of the Association is drawing to a close and it has been, as they say, a wonderful ride. Allow me to express my gratitude to all members for their trust and support and to the Committee members for their effort and sacrifices.

The Glorious 70th Anniversary of the 17th Kowloon (La Salle) Group

2007 was a very special year for La Salle. It was blessed with multiple important milestones. First, it was the 75th anniversary of the La Salle College; second, the 50th anniversary of the La Salle Primary School; and finally, the 70th anniversary of the 17th Kowloon Group. Under the leadership of the Group Committee, the Group had conducted a series of successful activities to commemorate her 70th anniversary. These activities included (a) ceremonial parade, (b) participation in the 21st World Scout Jamboree 2007 in U.K., (c) reunion banquet spring dinner, and (d) publication of a commemorative booklet.

The Parade: It was a major investiture event for 59 scouts and 7 venture scouts held on 27 October 2007 at the College. The ceremony was attended by over 200 scouts and their respective leaders. The cub scout pack, the scout troop, the venture scout unit and the rover scout crew all turned out in numbers in supporting the event. We were honoured to have Pau Shiu Hung SBS, the Chief Commissioner of the Scout Association of Hong Kong, to officiate at the ceremony along with many other important guests: Lai Kwok Wing, Kowloon City District Commissioner; the Principal and the Vice-Principal of La Salle College, the Headmistress of La Salle Primary School, Rev. Bro. Joseph and parents.

During the event, our Chairman, Nelson Lee, gave a vivid account of the success of the Group over the last 70 years with nearly 10,000 scouts invested. The Principal later commended Mr. Pau for his contribution to the scout movement in Hong Kong. In response, Mr. Pau was proud to declare himself a seventeener among the strong tradition of this Lasallian family. He reminded the scouts to always observe the Scout Promise, and by embracing it, our lives would be forever enriched with peace and happiness.

Among many spectacular performances were the sharp and tidy foot drill and the grand melody performed by the marching band of the Hong Kong Island Group 221 of the Correctional Services Department during the procession. They proudly demonstrated their confidence and ever ready willingness to accept social responsibilities as scouts.

The event closed with the presentation of the Golden Bauhinia Badges to the cub scouts and long service awards to the boy scouts and the venture scouts. Scouters received Wood Badges and the venture scouts were presented with the champion prizes in football competitions.

The 21st World Scout Jamboree 2007 in U.K.: Nine scouts led by their scout leader, Martin Wong, represented the 17th Group at the Jamboree held in July/August, 2007. Eight of the scouts received subsidies from the Committee and one scout received subsidies from the Scout Association. The occasion provided an excellent opportunity to broaden their vision in scouting through the participation of both on and off-site daily programmes. Joint activities held with fellow scouts from all over the world totaled more than 40,000 scouts including 675 from Hong Kong. Indeed, the camping offered the scouts a

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spectrum of exposure to different culture and friendship.

In a related issue, we were delighted to learn that one of the selected scouts, Master Henry Keung who obtained ten Grade A scores in the HKCEE, 2007 examination illustrated that scouting life in La Salle can also strengthen one's academic achievement.

Reunion Banquet Spring Dinner: This dinner was held on 23 February 2008 in the auditorium of La Salle College and was the highlight of our celebration. About 234 guests attended the event with more than 167 scouts and leaders from all the troops combined. This included Rev. Bro. Alphonsus, Rev. Bro. Joseph, Rev. Bro. Vincent, Charles Chan, President of LSCOBA, Dr. Bernard Kong, Lai Kwok Wing, K.C. District Commissioner, Cheung Lai Ching and Au Yeung Kwok Wai, K.C. District Asst. Commissioners, past scout leaders, old Lasallians and parents.

The Principal and Vice-Principal of La Salle College both thanked members of the Group Committee led by Nelson Lee and the two Vice-Chairmen, James Chiu and Karl Ng for their unfailing support of the Group as well as the overall scout movement in La Salle.

Nelson Lee spoke of the Group's 70 years of success with many splendid events and happy memories. He was grateful to the school authority for placing an exclusive chapter – The Glorious 17^{th} – describing the detailed development of the

Olympic Spirit comes to La Salle

On 2 May, the Olympic flame, symbol of the Olympic Games spirit, passed through Hong Kong in a historical Olympic Torch Relay. Among the 119 torch bearers were three Old Boys, namely John Chan (59 Form 7), Ronnie Wong (70) and Yu Sum Yee (01), and a La Salle College Form 2 student Chiu Chung Hei. Chiu Chung Hei, the youngest Olympic torch bearer in the relay, shares his historical experience in the following article:

I am Chiu Chung Hei, 13 years old. It is my honour to be nominated as one of the Beijing 2008 Olympic torch bearers representing Hong Kong. Hong Kong is the first stop of the Olympic Torch Relay within China. Being a member of the torch relay team, I have the privilege to experience the Olympic Games values and spirit at a more profound level.

Words could not possibly describe my anxiety about the arrival of the relay day, 2 May. I woke up especially early on that morning to prepare myself for the torch relay and arrived at the meeting point at 9:45 am. A role call was conducted by the officials and an Olympic torch was handed to each of the torch bearers. Along with our personal assistant for the day, we boarded the coach heading towards Hong Kong famous landmark, Tsing Ma Bridge.

I was scheduled to participate in the observatory section of the Tsing Ma Bridge. While I was waiting for the torch bearer, Mr Hung, before me, my heart was racing at a million beats per minute. I was so excited and nervous that I could hardly breathe. Before I realised, Mr Hung was already right in front of me. I raised my torch slowly and it was then lit by Mr Hung's torch. The transfer of the flame signified the start of my torch relay journey. I held the Olympic torch up high and started heading towards the observatory.


The short 200 meter run felt like ten thousand kilometers long. On the way, I saw teachers and students from different schools and other bystanders cheering and swinging the Chinese national flags. Everyone was cheering "Go Beijing", "Go Olympics". The experience was amazing. We were all there to celebrate the coming of the Beijing Olympic Games 2008. At that moment, all of my nervousness disappeared. The only feelings that remained were delight and elation. As I stood on the top of the observatory looking at my fellow citizens, my heart was blazing as strongly as the flame of the Olympic torch. Deep down at the bottom of my heart I wished for a very successful Beijing Olympics and the spreading of the message of world peace around the world just like the Olympic Torch Relay did. With my goals set on participating in the 2010 Youth Olympics and the 2012 London Olympics, I will give my very best effort to contribute to Hong Kong, China.

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Mark started off the casual presentation (ie beer in one hand) with the founding of St Joseph's College, and then to the development of the St Joseph's Branch School in TST (interestingly, only a 5 minute walk from the Marina's Club). He then shared on the interesting political position of La Salle's plot (immediately north of Boundary Street, thus resting on land "leased" rather than "ceded" to the British), the opening of the school (Dec 1931), the German Internment in La Salle (1939) and the Japanese attacks (1941). The talk continued on to the reopening of the school after the war (1946), the Perth Street days (1949-59) and then to the return to La Salle Road, and ended with the demolition of the old campus (1978) and the opening of the Quad.

There were frequent questions and sharings from the attendees, and some of the projected photos prompted the seniors to run to the screen to identify a friend or a teacher, and often a nickname from some 50 or 60 years ago. For many attendees, especially the younger Old Boys, the talk offered an insight into the school's rich history in a light and fun manner.

ROUND TABLE DINNER

About 55 Old Boys and 8 current La Salle College students attended the Round Table Dinner organised by the Professional Network Committee on Friday, 9 May at the World Trade Centre Club, 38/F World Trade Centre in Causeway Bay. The topic of the talk was "Investments in properties and funds, is it for you?"

Dr. Leung Ka Tung, Tony (71 Form 7), of L&D Associates fame and one of the major real estate agents in Hong Kong in 1997, provided reminiscence about the Hong Kong real estate agent business from the 1970s up to the present moment. He explained that properties in Hong Kong are traded as commodities and as such could be very difficult to get rid of during property downturn amid panic selling. His view for the coming year was for bearish sentiment. But when asked whether we should sell our properties, Tony reminded us that we should seek permission from our bosses, ie our wives, first.

Pong Po Lam, Paul, recipient of "World Outstanding Chinese Award" and founder of Pegasus Fund Managers Ltd, a renowned financial institution in Hong Kong, elaborated on the effects of bad debts on US financial institutions. He then offered an in-depth analysis of the various emerging markets before concluding that Taiwan has the best indicators for short to medium term growth.

President Charles Chan presented souvenirs to the two speakers at the end of the talk. A group photo was then taken and the school song sung, as usual, in the highest spirit.

Inside the LSCOBA

Law

In this final chapter of insiders' guide to LSCOBA operations, we look at the China Affairs Task Force, the Heritage Subcommittee, the School Liaison **Task Force, the Young Member Section Task Force** as well as the Recreation Subcommittee.

China Liaison Task Force



In 2006, I, together with members of the OBA and students of LSC, had the opportunity to visit the La Salle Study Centre (LSSC) run by Bro. David Liao in Changjiao Meizhou China, a remote village in the mountainous northeastern Guangdong region. Bro. David Liao from Malaysia was the Brother Visitor of the region until Brother Thomas

Lavin took over. There was an article on this subject in an earlier newsletter (Vol.25 No.4, June 2006) and I will not repeat the details here. Suffice to say that this study centre epitomizes the Lasallian way of serving the community with a spirit of faith.

In May this year, I met up with Bro. David again in Hong Kong and we talked about the recent happenings in LSSC. He also talked about the concern of the Beijing Central Government on the education of children whose parents are migrant workers working in factories across the country, especially those in the coastal southern provinces such as Guangdong. Bro. David suggested to the Christian Brothers to find ways to provide education opportunities to these children of poor migrant workers. The Brothers were receptive of his idea and Bro. David was asked to explore the possibilities. The Brothers felt that his work in Changjiao has been successful but the scope of his work at LSSC has reached its limit. The Brothers would like to explore the possibility of founding a Lasallian school in Mainland China which is much harder than it sounds under the existing education ordinances in China which makes it almost impossible for the La Salle Brothers as a religious order to own and run a private school in the Mainland.

To further explore this subject, Bro. Thomas, the current Brother Visitor, visited LSSC in Changijao in January this year and stayed for two nights. He was briefly introduced to the local culture and was invited to lunches and dinners hosted by villagers and parents. The Party Secretary and District Administration members also honoured him with a dinner. Bro. Thomas was referred to as the "white skin smiling visitor". Bro. Thomas spent time with the LSSC students, which numbered more than 300 currently, and was particularly impressed by a lot of them who spent time talking with him in English. Later, Bro. Thomas and Bro. David traveled to Meizhou to meet the Bishop of Meizhou and had lunch there. It was a good meeting for the Bishop

as Bro. Thomas promised to raise RMB100K to help the Bishop put up a new school in his home village of Wu Fa where he is the Chairperson of the School's Board of Governors.

As explained previously, the LSSC is NOT funded by the Christian Brothers (partly because of political

Heritage Subcommittee



Heritage can be defined as a legacy or tradition transmitted by or acquired from a predecessor. La Salle College possesses a unique heritage brought down through the generations by the Brothers, teachers and Old Boys. The Heritage Subcommittee was formed with the view of discovering, receiving, and preserving the traditions and legacies of the school and

acknowledging the people who formed it.

The first Heritage Subcommittee was formed in 2003 and headed ably by Peter Kam (77). Among the events held were annual visits to the Brothers' mausoleum in Happy Valley and memorial masses for deceased Brothers, teachers as well as alumni. A Heritage Musical Concert was held in 2005 with Old Boys and students musical performances. In 2005, I received the baton from Peter. With some research work done on the school's Perth Street years (1949-59), I presented a talk to Old Boys at a Happy Hour gathering, which many Old Boys enjoyed, showing that there was a strong interest in the Old Boys community for such "*old stories*" and history of the school.

In the same year, OBA requested the Heritage Subcommittee to embark on a new undertaking – to write a book on the history of La Salle College for its 75^{th} Anniversary in 2007. The Subcommittee accepted the challenge. I had previously carried out research into the school's history for several years, but had not seriously thought of presenting the material as a book. With the support of many Brothers, teachers, Old Boys

School Liaison Subcommittee

and students, the book was finally completed in time for the grand finale event of the celebrations in December 2007.

Even though the La Salle history book has been completed, the research into La Salle's history is far from over. As the saying goes, "*The more you know, the more you realise you don't know*". Through our research, the Heritage Subcommittee, together with Brother Patrick Tierney and Paul Tam, a teacher from St Joseph's Primary, identified at least 40 topics regarding La Salle's history that the school is still unclear about. Some of these are simple questions that require some light digging and asking around; some others may take weeks or even months to research into; and yet some answers may unfortunately never be found.

Personally, taking part in the OBA Heritage Subcommittee has been an immensely rewarding experience. Among other effects, I am more appreciative of the little things that are often taken for granted today. For instance, when I look up to the stone cross at the far end of today's soccer field, or when I drive up College Road, I can't help but think of the cross resting on the school Dome in the early 1930s, or think of the hill that Brother Aimar bought, flattened and built the school on in the late 1920s.

Journey into The History of La Salle

The school history book "Sons of La Salle everyone – A History of La Salle College and La Salle Primary School – 1932 - 2007" compiled by the Heritage Subcommittee contains invaluable information on the history of La Salle. Let's embark on a brief journey into the past in one of the chapters, titled "In Search of Pastures New," and trace the history of how Brother Aimar acquired the La Salle site.

The Negotiations

As early as October 1923, Brother Aimar wrote to the Hong Kong Colonial government requesting ten acres of land to erect a large boys' school with boarding facilities.

In now declassified internal government correspondence, the then Director of Education, E. Irving stated his view of Brother Aimar's request to his colleagues, drawing comparisons with schools that were developed around the same time:

If they erect buildings for 800 boys including 300 boarders, I don't think 10 acres is too much. The Diocesan School is getting over 20. The new site for Q.C. [Queen's College] is 12 acres.

In the same correspondence, Irving continued,

I am not form [sic, should be 'for'] any opinion as to how long it will be before they are able to get 800 boys. But they usually seem able to succeed in doing what they set out to do.

As to the locality, a remark made early in internal government documents gives some hint as to why such a rural location was granted. A.G.M. Fletcher, the then Colonial Secretary in Hong Kong commented on 10 November 1923 in internal government correspondence,

10 acres seems too much unless they go further afield.

Brother Aimar worked closely with the most senior ranks in the Colonial government authority. One of the many letters

from Brother Aimar to the Governor Sir Cecil Clementi, dated 22 April 1927, reads:

May it please Your Excellency to recall that in February 1926, I had the honour to accompany you on a visit to our present Kowloon School and to the proposed site for our future College.

When I saw Mr Fletcher in December, 1925, I asked for six acres as an absolute minimum. At the same time I pointed out that a site of six acres could not be regarded as sufficient for the requirements of a modern school of this size. ... Three and a half to four acres will be required for football, cricket and tennis grounds.

... A map from the mid 1920's shows that there were hardly any roads or structures around the La Salle site. There was but one house, which an early school document recorded:

> Across what was later on to become 'La Salle Road' was a garden lot of some three acres which Brother Aimar had acquired from Mrs. Chan Kwing Min, the wife of the former Waichow war-lord; there was a small Chinese house on the grounds, in which the Canadian Sisters of Our Lady of the Angels, newly arrived in the Colony, resided temporarily. There was not a single house standing on the southern side of Prince Edward Road.

... After several years of effort on Brother Aimar's part, the British Government was finally prepared to grant the land, as stated in a letter in September 1926 from L.S. Amery, Secretary of State for the Colonies from Downing Street, London to the Hong Kong Colonial Office:

I have the honour to inform you that I approve the proposals ... for increasing the area of land to be granted to the Christian Brothers as a new site for their present branch school in Chatham Road, Kowloon.

In a letter dated 23 November 1927, Brother Aimar finally received a notice from the Director of Public Works, A.E. Wright:

Kindly inform me whether you are prepared to bid the upset price for the lot on these conditions.

Finally, on 12 March 1928, about three months later, Brother Aimar replied,

I have the honour to inform you that I am prepared to bid the upset price.

Indeed, Brother Aimar added:

I shall be much obliged if you will arrange for the auction sale to take place as soon as possible.

Brother Aimar was a man in a hurry.

In the Government Gazette dated 10 April 1928, an announcement was made for the sale of the Crown Land by public auction.

On Monday, 23 April 1928 at 3 pm, at the uncontested auction, Brother Aimar acquired 10 acres (435,600 square feet) of land for HK\$120,000. The per square foot price was under HK\$0.28.
