

Dear Fellow Lasallians,

Most of you are no doubt aware of the announcement by HSBC Holdings PLC on 2 March 2009 that it proposes to raise US\$17.7b by way of a fully underwritten rights issue on the basis of 5 new ordinary shares for every 12 existing ordinary shares. The issue price for shareholders on the Hong Kong branch has been set at HK\$28.00 per new ordinary share. As of 3 March 2009, LSCOBA held 36,673 ordinary shares of HSBC. These shares of HSBC Holding, the single largest asset held by the Association, were acquired by our predecessors to meet unanticipated needs in future as a measure to support the OBA should it experience tough economic times. During the regular Board Meeting held on 2 March 2009, the topic of HSBC rights issue was discussed in detail. The Committee agreed to conduct a round of consultation, including but not limited to seeking views from Past Presidents of the Association and Old Boys who are financial experts in the field, in order to explore the pros and cons of exercising the option. HSBC Rights Issue Investment Forum/ Happy Hour Gathering, was held on 16 March 2009 during which valuable input by attending Old Boys were gathered and preferences categorized for the Committee's final meeting on the subject held on 22 March 2009. Several options put forward by Members were thoroughly vetted for their merits and finally, a partial subscription of 10,000 shares, out of the entitled total of 15,280 shares, was favoured by the majority. The remaining 5,280 rights would be offered to La Salle Foundation at Monday's (23 March 2009) closing price in Hong Kong. Should La Salle Foundation opt not to take up the offer, these rights will be sold to the market on Tuesday, 24 March 2009. The proceeds thus received will be used to subscribe the above mentioned 10,000 new shares of HSBC at HK\$28 per share with the balance financed by the Association's internal resources. The Committee has the intention to donate these 10,000 new shares so subscribed, or its cash equivalent at the time, to the College on her 80th anniversary and hence, expressed this wish for the 2012-2013 Committee to consider.

The Family Fun Day 2009 of LSC was held on Sunday, 22 February from 10:30am to 4:30pm at the school field. It was a day of fun and games for all ages and many Members, some with their families, joined the festivities while supporting our Alma Mater.

Our big family - the Group Committee of The 17th Kowloon Group





Royal Asiatic Society Lecture on The History of La Salle College



During the talk, Mark offered an overview of the beginning of the De La Salle Brothers' work in Hong Kong in 1875 to start St. Joseph's College. He then told of the commencement of the St. Joseph's Branch School in 1917, and then the purchase of 10 land in rural Kowloon and the commencement of La Salle College in 1932. Mark continued with our La Salle war time stories, as well as shared tales of bravery of Old Boys during the war, some giving up their lives. Classes resumed after the war, but Mark told of another battle that began in 1949, when the campus was taken over by the British Army, and the Brothers fought for ten years to get it back. Mark then shared the Brothers' decision to give up the old building for a state-of-the-art new school building.

Throughout the lecture, Mark offered references to the historic background of Hong Kong and even worldwide, and it goes to tell how closely La Salle's history is tied to historical events in Hong Kong and around the world. For example, Hitler's attack on Poland, and Britain's declaration of war in 1939 (La Salle was converted into a German internment facility), and the rising of Communist China in 1949, (the British Army took over LSC to create a hospital in case Mao's Army attacked HK).

To support the narration, Mark offered many photos of the school and old Hong Kong, which kept the audience captivated. Besides offering the story of the school, Mark also shared on how he and his team researched for and uncovered material, ranging from using the HK Public Records Office, searching on Google, interviewing with seniors Old Boys and

local historians, to finding old photos and out-of-print books on eBay and other websites.

At the end of his talk, Mark thanked the many members of the Society, themselves accomplished historians, who supported his research. Among them were well known local historian, Jason Wordie; Associate Professor in the Department of History in HKU, Dr Peter Cunich, himself an alumni of a Lasallian school in Australia; and former Chief Curator of the HK Museum of History, Dr Joseph Ting, who is also a St Joseph's Old Boy. Last but not least, Mark also showed his gratitude to two of the Society's members who supported him but had unfortunately passed away since: Rev. Carl Smith and Professor Anthony Sweeting, both much respected historians in Hong Kong.

For all that the RAS members had offered to Mark throughout his research, it was only fitting that Mark was able to offer a lecture back to the Society. It was an honor for both the LSCOBA and to Mark for being invited to talk for this esteemed Society. As remarked by the emcee of the evening, the lecture was "a memorable and, rightly, educational evening".

PRINCE OF WALES HOSPITAL VISIT

On Saturday, 28 February the LSCOBA Professional Network Subcommittee organised a visit to the Hong Kong Jockey Club Minimally Invasive Surgical Skills Training Center at the Prince of Wales Hospital in Shatin and some 32 Old Boys and guests attended. Dr Philip Chiu (1987), Associate Professor in the Department of Surgery at the Chinese University of Hong Kong, explained that minimally invasive surgery, popularly known as "keyhole surgery", is the established trend in surgical disciplines and Hong Kong is one of the leading centres of excellence in the world.

Another Lasallian intern Dr Yip Hon Chi (01), a new graduate with Distinction in Surgery and Medicine, shared his insight on the life of a medical student at CUHK, most notably the overwhelming presence of the many female classmates, with ratio running as high as 7 to 3! This was followed by a visit to the Endoscopy Center and a look at the surgeon's assistant - the Da Vinci robot, and hands on trial at the many simulators. A networking lunch took place at the nearby floating restaurant after the group visited the student hostel. It was of interest to note that, contrary to popular belief, the Centre trains doctors instead of medical students and that live pigs were used as the training material.



Obituary: Brother Herman Fenton F.S.C. (1913-2009)

Brother Herman Fenton F.S.C. passed away peacefully on Saturday, 21 February 2009 at 4:30 pm, at the ripe old age of 95.

The funeral service for Brother Herman was held on 25 February in St Teresa's Church, Kowloon, at 9:30 am, followed by the burial at the Happy Valley St Michael Catholic Cemetery at the Brothers' Plot.

Brother Herman was born in County Limerick, Ireland in April 1913. He arrived in Hong Kong together with Brother Raphael Egan in October 1947 and the two Brothers joined the La Salle College community within a few years from each other. Brother Herman taught in LSC from 1947 to 1969 and was the Sports Master of the school.

While still teaching at LSC in 1965, Brother Herman founded the La Salle Evening School which used the LSC campus from 3:30pm to 8pm on school days, and many of the teachers in the evening school were from LSC. This school, with over 500 students, was the Brothers' response to the great demands in Hong Kong for more school places at the time, especially for the poorer children. In 1969, the Evening School moved to a newly built campus in Homantin to become Chan Sui Ki (La Salle) College, with Brother Herman as the Founder and first Principal.

At the 40th Anniversary celebrations of Chan Sui Ki (La Salle) College held earlier in February 2009, Brother Patrick Tierney, Guest of Honour of the opening ceremony, shared the following on Brother Herman, the Founder of the school:

Although we are sorry he cannot be with us today, we thank God that Brother Herman is still alive and still keenly interested in the affairs of the College. In fact he holds the distinction of having founded 3 schools in all: La Salle Evening School, Chan Sui Ki (La Salle) College and Chan Sui Ki (La Salle) Primary School. Learning of the passing of Bro. Herman, one Old Boy of the evening school said:

Brother Herman was offering the same elite LSC education to the less fortunate boys, who otherwise could not afford a secondary school education. Thank God! I was one of the poor boys who benefited from the Evening school. The elite LSC education has changed my life, and changed so many other poor boys like me.

Brother Herman was a witness to La Salle College's many landmark events. He arrived in Hong Kong in 1947 to see LSC recouping from the Second World War. He was there when the British Army took over the campus and put the school into Perth Street hutments. He came back to the La Salle Road campus in around 1960, and a few years later, began his work on the Evening School, then Chan Sui Ki (La Salle) College and later Chan Sui Ki (La Salle) Primary School. He also lived through the decision to demolish the old La Salle building and the building of the new campus in the late 1970s. Brother Herman remained active in the CSK front throughout his life, and lived on the Brother quarters on campus for many years. It was in the last few years that Brother Herman moved to live in La Salle College.

Up to his last days, Brother Herman had always been alert and followed the developments and affairs of CSK closely. We are sure that Brother Herman was very pleased with the significant milestone that the Chan Sui Ki (La Salle) College had reached 40 years after his founding of the school.

When I was writing the book for the school's history in LSC in 2007, I remember seeing Brother Herman being taken on his wheelchair to the Brothers' Library to read. He was not only quietly reading, but he was also excitedly explaining what he was reading to the assistant who was looking after him. Indeed he was sill sharp and caring towards others up till his last days.
