
©What Does La Salle's Feng Shui Hold for Us? (Part 1)

Anthony Ip is a Josephian, an Urban Planner, and a Cultural Industry Practitioner. Our Founder Brother Aimar Pierre Saurant could not have found a site with better Feng Shui (or geomancy) for La Salle College (LSC). More than merely a "Most Majestic School Building in the Far East", he may have envisioned a base for farming out La Sallian Education to the whole of China. He may even have intended the La Salle Primary School building to house at least 30 novitiates to supply more manpower for those Brothers already operating in North East China (the so-called "Manchuko" that flopped in 1945).

Locally, LSC was in the midst of two tectonic plates of the East meeting and colliding with the West. Imperial China was at its weakest at a time when Britain at its mightiest. Surprisingly, colonialism brought about some blissful changes - Christianity and modernity that not only Hong Kong but China also sorely needed. And LS Education was an exemplar. However, working environments for the missionary were often outside a comfort zone, but they were often bold and entrepreneurial - Brother Aimar was one such person.



Feng Shui Map 1: - A symbolic representation of LSC in K-Tong & K-City Complex - by Thomas Yip & Anthony Ip.




Feng Shu Map 3 - Boundary St that divided the perpetual secession of South Kowloon and the leased territories north of it was history itself. Kai Tak Airport was to the L. The upcoming Kai Tak HK Rail Station would signify HK's further reunification with the Motherland.

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Feng Shui Map 2 - The new look of the edifice, immature plantations on the slopes and the absence of a sentry quard house (demolished only in the 60's) built by the Japanese occupation forces at the driveway entrance on L is absent all point to the vintage, ie 30's. Pls also note that La Salle Road and Nga Tsin Wai Road (on R) are not thoroughfares. The latter is higher. Lion Rock is the backdrop on the North with the Corinthian main entrance facing South (the direction of the Harbor). Perching on a knoll, it commanded a panoramic of almost the entire south Kowloon peninsula. All the requisites of good Feng Shui are present - a mere coincidence or a master had been consulted? "左高右低背龜山,南面朱雀水環抱,明堂開廣腳踏鳳凰案."1





代表左方的青龍方要比代表右方的白虎方地勢要高。也就是說如果家宅的左右方有山頭,必須要左方的山勢比右方高。一般來說,中國人講究「長幼有序」。北玄武方一定是主屋,是大家長跟祖先牌位的所在,屋後的大玄武龜山。就代表長子家業雄厚,後背有靠玄武方的祖先牌位,代表祖傳的家業,具有不動泰山的宗族延續的力量。現代風水則強調「左青龍右白虎」,認爲左高右低是好風水的吉兆。可以家族興旺,庇蔭三代。也代表家族。「族長」地位亦立不搖,力主家業。住在山坡地上,最好面對家門口,左手邊的是往山上的方向,右手邊是往山下的方向爲佳。

要如何確定家中哪邊是左,哪邊是右呢?人在室內面朝門的方向看,左手邊就是青龍方,右手邊就是白虎方。

"**吉屋形狀**" 正方形- 近方的長方形在風水理論上屬金,五行當中的金的代表形狀即爲方形. 中國人喜歡方方正正的房屋,除了在視覺上給人穩重跟地基穩固的感覺,最爲便利且易於格局規劃。

"天財屋形"所謂天財屋顧名思義就是天生的財寶倒進家中,天財屋前圓後方,可以讓財源滾滾來,只要屋內設計隔間方正,就可以財富源源不盡的滾動進到屋裡來。

"階梯形" 樓房在形狀上從前大門 往後如樓梯般往上爬的「上樓形」大樓,可形成所謂「步步高升」局把三角形或者多邊形的房宅或隔間建造成四方形,就可避煞。多出來的空間,種種花草,美化環境,也帶給左右鄰舍和諧的氣氛。


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Kowloon Tong (K-Tong) was founded as a Garden City ² in 1920's on Ebenezer Howard's concepts of the Garden of Eden.³ ⁴ As a planner and a social reformist he espoused a close and harmonious relationship between Man and Nature in order to achieve an utopian state, (quite a parallel to Taoism), and a house should be gardened and with trees. As well, the community should be self-sustaining and complete with supporting amenities and facilities.

The colonial government however, had its other concerns - to ease off the residential land shortage for the affluent classes (mainly the Europeans and some of the local Portuguese communities). Alongside with LSC, there were other Christian institutions like Maryknoll Convent School, St. Teresa's Church, Christchurch and Diocesan Boys' School a bit further away, with even more iconic ones mushroomed


after WW2. To-day one could call K-Tong the **second** " **Historical Trail of Christianity in HK" in addition to the first along Garden Road.**



Feng Shui Map 6: "In Dignified Company." St Teresa's Church at Prince Edward Rd. c mid-'30's. The railway crossing of the Kowloon-Canton Railway is at the foreground. Our long time neighbor & friend Diocesan Boys' School should be at the lower R, but not in the picture.

"Ironies, Dilemmas and Paradoxes In The Garden of Eden."

The apple was probably the origin of it all. Even Ebenezer Howard, an idealist could not fully realize his dream here at K-Tong, that was juxtaposed with K-City. Nevertheless, it bore witness to many of the historical changes since Kowloon was annexed as part of the colony. But somehow, LSC mitigated those conflicts through education: Value and Didactic Education brought about more than "Heroes by the Score" and many turned out to be agents of socio-economic transformation.





Poetic and serene setting similar to that of a small English town belied the social divides prevailing. Street named after English counties. An expression of class consciousness or just a relief of the inhabitants' homesickness? Vintage: early to mid-30's.

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Maryknoll Convent School (early to mid-50's). The campus has always been as exuberant and immaculate as the occupants. More than just an old friend and a good neighbor but with many crossovers.



The Anglican Christchurch and Diocesan Primary & Preparatory Schools, North Kowloon. Here we see the inception of city planning of Kowloon Tong, an agglomerate of residential, religious, education, community, transportation and even military uses all along the main artery Waterloo Road.





The China Light & Power office (1952 QE2 Coronation Year) at Boundary across Waterloo Road facing Maryknoll Convent School. Its majestic architecture graced the entire community all the way to head office and even a high class residential area named after the tycoon Kadoorie.



Sunderland Court at Osborne Barrack - quarters in 70's. Later developed into high rises but now used by PLA personnel after 1997. Gun Club-Osborne-Sek Kong Barracks formed a vertical axis of the British line of defense on land.

Mo Fan Village (translated with sarcastic humor as Model Village 模範村) - along the same Renfrew Road and La Salle Road was a slum once used by the Japanese during WW2 to house laborers working for the extension of Kai Tak Airport. Until its redevelopment in 70's it was an enclave of cottage industries, a duck pond, shacks for lower classes and even vice dens.
