## **Berlin Beckoning**

For a while, Berlin has been calling out to me. Since our son Aaron moved there nearly a year prior, we wanted to spend Thanksgiving with him. Though this would be the third visit to this historic and cultural city for my wife Maureen, she promptly made our travel plans. For eight days we lodged in Kurfürstendamm, within walking distance to the renowned Zoologischer Garten.

## First Impressions

On the evening of November 21, we wasted no time in reaching the Brandenburg Gate. It was a demarcation separating East Berlin and West Berlin and now is a majestic monument with four-horse chariot and the Goddess of Peace riding on the top symbolizing peace and unity. Standing in front of the nearby Reichstag building, the modernization effort of British architect Norman Foster with his ingenious glass dome reinforces the

significance of the reunification of Germany – forsaking past failures and emerging to lead the European Union. Adjacent to

this segment of the Spree River is the Chancellery, where Chancellor Angela Merkel and a host of government departments labor their executive tasks. We wound our way to the Museum Island but did not go inside any of the museums due to construction work.

On subsequent days, we returned to the eastern part of Berlin along that section of Unter den Linden and toured Humboldt University, German History Museum (GHM), Berlin Cathedral, and St. Hedwig's [Catholic] Church. The GHM audio guide paced us through the turbulent German history and provided us time to visit the museum annex designed by I. M. Pei. Once again, the Chinese-American architect inspires visitors with his signature glass canopy over the courtyard that connects the old and new wings, and a spiral staircase next to tall glass panels forming the exterior walls of the extension.



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The Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe is south of the Brandenburg Gate. The Memorial is Germany's public atonement for its atrocities against millions of Jews during WWII. Thousands of grave-like pillars of different dimensions laid obtusely and indistinctly of any order on nearly five acres of this central district. The juxtaposition of the Gate and the Memorial is most poignant.

#### A Closer Look

Maureen and I submitted our requests to enter the Reichstag building and got the passes to visit on Friday morning, November 25. Following a group of visitors, we took the elevator to the base of the glass cupola (Norman Foster's dome constructed on the roof of the renovated Reichstag) and each got a free GPS-driven audio guide. As we walked up the spiral ramp, the audio guide would direct us to gaze at the surrounding Berlin cityscape. The process of identifying the landmarks that we had visited or would visit helped us register their geographical relationships. Continuing our ascent, we admired the design of the central cone with hundreds of mirrors that reflect sunlight down to bathe the parliament assembly hall. Through here, visitors can look at the German Bundestag in action, symbolizing transparency in government. Another unique design is the revolving sun shield that tracks the sun as the earth rotates, and blocks any direct sunlight from penetrating the assembly hall. Reaching the top of the dome, one can walk around the circular platform to have a bird's eye view of the panorama. We walked around the Reichstag roof to capture again the cityscape and to peek at the offices below. Being in the open air and under cold weather for over two hours, we treated ourselves a cup of latte and cakes at the Reichstag's Dachgarten restaurant.

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### **Berlin Wall Memorial**

At the Berlin Wall Memorial on Bernauer Strasse, we paid tribute to the 136 victims during the intense division between East Berlin and West Berlin. We looked at the remnants of the Berlin Wall, pictures of the victims, and listened to the audio announcing their names and the date of their demise in German and English. The Berlin Wall fell on November 9, 1989 and the event heralded the reunification of Germany on October 3, 1990.

#### **Christmas Markets**

On early Sunday morning, we walked through and photographed the Christmas market at the Kaiser Wilhelm Memorial Church, before the stalls were open. The next day we toured the Christmas market at Gendarmenmarkt, neatly lining the square in front of the Konzerthaus Berlin. On each side of the Berlin Symphony's Concert Hall are the German Church and the French Church. Their prominent domes compete for equal attention.

#### **Concert Lovers**

We attended three concerts at the renowned Berliner Philharmonie Concert Hall. The first one was a free Tuesday lunch concert of chamber music. Aaron joined us on the second concert on Sunday, November 27, where we sat on the first row seats slightly to the left of the piano, watching Avan Yu (余沛霖) perform Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 2 with Sergej Bolkhovets conducting the Sinfonie Orchester Schoeneberg. According to his website, Avan was born in Hong Kong, grew up in Vancouver, won numerous prestigious awards including the 12th Sydney International Piano Competition, is now studying with Klaus Hellwig at the Berlin University of the Arts, and is also interested in conducting.

For our grand finale on Monday, November 28, Aaron treated us to the concert under the baton of Wolfgang Roese with the ORSO Orchestra and Choral Society. The choral ensemble consisted of 350 male and female vocalists from different choral groups including one from Iceland. They would render their voices in Ralph Vaughan Williams' Symphony No. 1. Before the concert, maestro Roese spoke in German and English announcing dozens of refugees in the audience, whose attendance was sponsored by ORSO's patrons, and stating that "we are all refugees in the world." An ORSO organizer followed by saying that the proceeds from the concert would be used to prepare another boat to rescue refugees in the Mediterranean Sea and so far in 2016, they had rescued 6,500 refugees. That night, the music and the spirituality of Antonin Dvorak's Symphony No. 9 deeply penetrated the mind and souls of the audience. According to Wikipedia, Dvorak composed the popular New World Symphony in 1893 and Neil Armstrong took a recording of it to the moon during the Apollo 11 mission. Come to think of it — what makes us free and soar high?

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#### **Mindfulness**

Berlin offers much more than I could absorb in eight days. Berliners are friendly -- in each encounter, they answered our questions with clear directions. The public transportation is convenient. A bus driver in Potsdam waited for us as we were running towards his bus stop. Few passengers looked at their mobile devices. They would either read their newspapers or converse with their commuting friends. Elementary school children, too, would use the same public facility to schools by themselves as early as 7:00 a.m. when the outside temperature was in the mid 30's Fahrenheit.

The transformation of Germany since its reunification demonstrates its national leadership and the cognizance of its citizens. The records of past tragedies are displayed openly. A

few Internet articles reported that some senior citizens shed

tears upon climbing up the dome of the Reichstag. The younger generation is mindful of the country's role in the European Union, absorbing the lessons of the history that surrounds them at every turn in this city.
