Earlier this year, I had the opportunity to visit, with members from the OBA and students of LSC, the LSSC (La Salle Study Centre) run by Bro. David in Changjiao (Meizhou, China), a remote village in the mountains of northeastern Guangdong. There was an article on this subject in the last newsletter (Vol.25 No.4, June 2006) and I will not repeat the details here. Suffice to say that this study centre epitomizes the spirit to serve the community Bro. Thomas is talking about.

We are a giving people, give as well to the community as we intend our Alma Mater. Give to our community our energy, our care, our time.....Make this the giving year. Make a difference because we can.

La Salle College Old Boys Global Reunion

Thrilling

Our year long "challenge" started on July 29, 2005 when Mike Kwong (67), President of our Chapter, accepted the nomination from the old boys attending the 2005 LSCOPA North America Soccer Cup & World Conference in Los Angeles to host these events in 2006. Since the inception of these events, the organizing LSCOPA chapters had all done terrific jobs. Being the smallest chapter in North America, we were afraid that we might not be able to meet the high standards that had been set.

To the old boys in Edmonton, this would be a once-in-a-lifetime experience to have such a big event coming to the small city. It was too good an opportunity to pass. Fortunately, we had a good leader. As soon as returned from Los Angeles, Mike immediately assigned chapter directors to start brainstorming and collecting information and, wasting no time.

Challenging

It was an extremely challenging task to organize this big event. However, the Edmonton boys were all excited and committed to do something for the old boys community and our Alma Mater. After long discussions, it was agreed to set our goals as follows

1. Bring together old boys from different geographical regions
2. Unite old boys from all ages and different graduation years
3. Bring harmony and bonding among all generations

We realized that our chapter might not be able to accomplish all these set objectives in one event, but was willing to take the first stride in this direction. Therefore we took the



following as the theme for the 2006 gathering:

Bridging the Gap, Moving Ahead

We also understand that fun would be a very important ingredient for success and we kept this in mind when designing activities for the old boys.

Earthbreaking

Inspired by the individual class reunions held each year, we name the 2006 gathering in Edmonton a Global Reunion, hoping that many class reunions would be held in Edmonton when old boys come from around the world for this annual event. This was a bold and daring step, but the



reactions of the participating old boys proved that we did not make a bad decision afterall.

To mark this special occasion, we organized the La Salle Global Reunion Cup – a dedicated local horse race. As first we have concerned that Brother Thomas, our Guest of Honour and some old boys might not feel comfortable with such event. Luckily, they all understood that we are not trying to promote gambling. With their blessing, we are safe.



Nail biting

Twelve months of nervous preparation was finally over on August 3; the boys in Edmonton

were ready to greet the over 200 visitors - old boys and their families. We were especially excited to await the arrival of the two current La Salle students who won the Student Essay Contest held just a few months earlier. Their trips to the Global Reunion in Edmonton were sponsored by a group of generous old boys. Their participation in the Global Reunion was to showcase our theme of uniting boys from all ages. To our great disappointment, the trips did not materialize because of flight cancellation due to inclement weather in Hong Kong.

There were other challenges. On his way from the U.K., Brother Thomas had stopped over in New York for a few days to enjoy the hospitality of the old boys of the New York Chapter. Bad weather delayed his departure flight from New York so much that he could not make it to Toronto in time to catch his connecting flight to Edmonton. After many hours of nail biting, Brother Thomas finally arrived and made it to the postponed dinner reception. However, we had to cancel the night city tour originally arranged for him. Some old boys were not as lucky and did not arrive until 2 am the next morning.

Relaxing & Exciting



Global Reunion Edmonton 2006 officially opened at 2 pm on the afternoon of Aug 4 at the Ramada Hotel Conference Hall when Brother Thomas led us in the singing of the best song in the world. As many old boys were still on the way to Edmonton, only about 60 old boys joined the conference. They were

updated with the latest development of our Alma Mater through a video specially produced for the Reunion, thanks to Dr. Paul Lau for this excellent idea.

The old boys actively participated in the 90-minute breakout group discussions on La Salle Heritage, mentoring program and future conferences held in three smaller conference rooms. Brother Thomas joined two of the discussion groups contributing valuable comments.

Although time was limited for discussions, the conference still led to valuable conclusions. The full proceedings will be published in the Conference page of the Global Reunion web site towards the end of the year.



After the conference, the old boys had a chance to taste the famous Alberta beef when they gathered in a lounge specially booked for the old boys to exchange toast and empty bottles while enjoying the brotherhood atmosphere.

The boys reluctantly left around midnight to prepare for the football matches the next morning.

The 5th LSCOPA North American Cup Soccer Tournament was kicked off by Brother Thomas at 8 am at the Coronation Field when many old boys were still rubbing their eyes with one hand and a cup of coffee in the other hand. Teams from Toronto, Vancouver, Southern California and San Francisco were competing with the host team formed with players from Edmonton, New York and Hong Kong. Mark Huang was our goalie. After 10 round robin games played over two days, the young and energetic Team Toronto took the cup home for the third time in three years.

After the five games scheduled for day 1, many old boys and families rushed to the Northlands Park to attend the La Salle Global Reunion Cup 2006 horse race while enjoying a delicious buffet in a large VIP room reserved for the group. The balcony was right above the finishing line and afforded everyone a good view of the entire race course. Upon arrival, Brother Thomas placed a bet on behalf of the Global Reunion. He said that he was helping to raise funds for the organizing committee, and so he did! Now you should know that there is a new channel to raise funds.



While the tournament games were fun to watch, everybody was looking forward to the game afterwards – the “old” boys’ game. Brother Thomas agreed to play the game on condition that he only played for at most 10 minutes. There was so much fun in the game that Brother Thomas ended up playing the complete match – 40 minutes in total! Everybody was excited to see Brother Thomas still in good shape. Brother Thomas could not stop telling people that he had made history. The team with Brother Thomas playing was awarded a penalty kick. Brother Thomas scored with the kick (see picture) and he is the first La Salle Brother to score a game winning goal with a penalty kick as this is the only goal of the game.



The Reunion Night Banquet was the highlight program of the entire Global Reunion. The banquet started with a march in. The flag of each participating chapter was carried on the stage by a second generation Lasallian accompanied

by the chapter president or designated representative. The possession was accompanied by a marching version of our school song. The entire crowd gave a standing ovation with non-stop applause. The excitement of the crowd was then brought to new height by the performance of the martial arts champion team which won a total of eleven medals at the recent world martial arts championship. Then Brother Thomas brought us to a new spiritual level by explaining the true meaning of our school song.

The banquet was filled with fun, laughter and thousands of camera flashes. The climax was the line dance led by Brother Thomas while old boys were singing karaoke on the stage. George Law (66), president of San Francisco Chapter was the happiest man because he was drawn the winner of the 50/50 lucky draw by the youngest kid in the banquet hall. Congratulations to George whose prize money allowed him an “almost free” trip to the Global Reunion!

After the Reunion, many old boys went to the Rockies for a one day tour before heading home. A special two-day tour was organized for Brother Thomas to re-visit the beautiful scenery in the Rockies. A few old boys joined the Banff tour to accompany Brother Thomas. We could only afford to arrange a one day trip to the Rockies two years ago when Brother Thomas first visited Edmonton. This time, we had more time to spare in every place we stopped – including Athabasca Falls, Columbia Icefields, Peyto Lake and Lake Louise. Everyone was touched by the beauty, calmness and peacefulness in Nature. Brother Thomas had made another wish hoping to return in two years time after his first made two years ago came true. The trip ended in Calgary where Brother Thomas was joined by several old boys in Calgary for dinner. The next morning, Brother Thomas left for Vancouver to start his journey back to Hong Kong. After a brief trip to Drumheller – the historical dinosaur site, Mark Huang (85) went back to Banff for his long awaited horse back riding hike. Constantine Au (87) and Derek Lin (01) returned with the rest of the group to Edmonton to help boost the local economy there.



Praying

I pray that Global Reunion of La Salle old boys can continue year after year. I pray that there will be more fun and attendance at Global Reunion 2007, which will be held in Hong Kong. I pray that the saying “there will be more old boys from North America attending the gathering in Hong Kong than old boys from Hong Kong attending gatherings in North America” will become true. I pray that the saying “old boys attending Global Reunion 2007 in Hong Kong will also be home-coming and not just attending guests” will also be true. I pray that God will help all old boys to become united to help our Alma Mater to sail through any stormy waters ahead

Brothers, let us converge!

The Global Lasallian Reunion in 2006 was taken up by one of the smallest chapters of the La Salle College communities: Edmonton. Compared with other "power house" overseas Chapters from the likes of California ones or from Toronto, Edmonton was tiny in numbers, but big in heart and ambition.

What touched me first was not the actual conference, but rather the meticulous preparation of the whole event: the website, the pre-reunion on-line discussions, the information provided to participants etc. Much thought and care has obviously been put in.

On the first day of the conference, one word in Br. Thomas' opening speech stood out loud. "Convergence". Br. said it was a popular word in Israel lately, where Br. had been living for the last year or so. In our La Salle context, Br. Thomas' view of the coming 75th anniversary year was two fold: Lasallians from all over the world converging back to school, and a new convergence of students, parents, staff and the Brothers.

As the events proceeded, I felt a strong and common sentiment invariably running across the various old boys and chapters they represented. Everyone was dedicated to something for our La Salle, be it for her students, for fellow old boys, our teachers and Brothers or for the school at large. The hearts were focused on the same broad direction, but the roads taken differed. I felt there was a need to consolidate and focus efforts, resources and probably even targets. Something on a global scale may be called for. I do not have an answer to this, but I hope that this thought and feeling leaves old boys to mull over. The Reunion's title was "Bridging the Gap, Moving Ahead". Maybe this was one of the gaps the Edmontonians wished to bridge?

In my brief sharing with the attendees at the Reunion Night Banquet, I echoed to all a message I received constantly from

overseas old boys. Overseas old boys did not want to be "guests" at next year's reunion. They want to be part of the event as contributors, sharing ideas, participating in the organizing of the event, getting their own hands dirty. I promised to convey that point to the HK OBA, and I take this chance to keep this promise openly.

I also shared with the attendees that they should all get ready to "go home for dinner". The date for the old boys global reunion has been set for 1st to 8th December 2007. Mark the date and be ready to come home. No one goes home for dinner as a "guest", and so shouldn't overseas old boys.

In the closing speech of the Reunion by Edmonton Chapter President Calvin Chan, he pleaded with tears for old boys to put aside differences and to work together as a family in strong brotherhood. Calvin broke down and was hardly able to continue his speech; but nevertheless the dead air was filled by the warm applause from the floor, encouraging him to complete his message, which he earnestly did.

Are we boys of courage to take a brave *yet humble* step to converge?

Thank you to Calvin and the Edmonton old boys for making the Edmonton Global Reunion absolutely memorable, touching and rewarding. OBA HK has a big order to fill for December 2007. And I know it will not disappoint.

Remember to come home for dinner in December 2007.
