Dear Lasallians,

I am humbly honored to have this opportunity to serve you as the President of LSCOPA this term. My heartfelt appreciation to all the past presidents and their cabinets for the great works they have accomplished for the Association, laying down the solid foundations on which the OBA is built and developed today.

I started my OBA journey since 2003 when Dr. Bernard Kong (76), Past President, invited me to lead a task force to launch the LSCOPA credit card. I eventually joined his cabinet in 2004 as a committee member and later became the Honorary Secretary the following two terms. I am thankful for being able to serve the members and Alma Mater all these years and now starting a new chapter of my Lasallian life. As President, I have set 5 missions to achieve in the areas of bonding, support, community service, publicity and communication, as well as fund-raising.

Bonding: To enhance bonding and connection between old boys and with different stakeholders

Support: To support and acknowledge contributors to the Lasallian education mission

Community Service: To contribute and support to those in need in our community

Publicity & Communication: To publicize the School and Lasallian achievements

Fund-raising: To raise funds to support the School and the student developmental needs

It is important for OBA to create and bring values to its members, who may then see the benefits for joining the Association. Since the inception of the new term in July 2016, a number of OBA events have taken place and some of them are exclusive to OBA members. Overseen by the Sports Subcommittee (Convenor: Herman Bo 89), the Old Boys' Soccer League (Convenor: James Yu 90) has started while the

Basketball league (Convenor: Drago Chan 87) has resumed this season and kicked off in August 2016, with 8 teams competing in regular and playoff games. The LSC Old Boys' Concert 2016 (Convenor: Martin So 04) held on 17 September 2016 was the very first OBA homecoming event where we had both the new principals, Mr. Tong W. S. from La Salle College, and Mrs. Chandni Rakesh from La Salle Primary School, with us as our guests of honour. What's more, this is the first time we had the OBA press release (Publicity Convenor: Yick Ping Fai 96) publicized in a few local newspapers.

As for the Heritage Cup 2016 held on 30 September 2016, our Old Boy golf team led by captain IPP Leonard Chu (83) fought hard and retained the trophy for ourselves this year. We also hosted a roundtable dinner (Convenor: Ray Sun 85) on 2 November 2016 with senior old boy Mr. Peter Wong 王冬勝先生 (1970) as guest speaker giving our members an insightful talk. Other events including Job Shadowing (Convenor: Stanley Shum 79), Monthly Happy Hours (Convenor: Eric Chow 00), Doctors of La Salle Dinner (Convenor: Thomas Fung 96) as well as Winter Golf event (Convenor: Thomas Tung 77) were successfully held to serve our members or support the students. We also provided souvenir sales (Convenor: Claudio Chan 08) and reunion gathering (Convenor: Stanley Shum 84) support for old boys of different classes at the School Hall. Our Investment Subcommittee (Convenor: Alan Lui 79), one of the 22 OBA Subcommittees which was established this term, took the lead to review and study how we can generate the best return financially to OBA in support of the School and student development.

Besides putting the efforts to increase the value and benefits for OBA members, I have done a few actions to enhance the communication and transparency of OBA such as rejuvenating the OBA website lscoba.com feeding with the latest OBA

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events as well as initiating a regular email notice to keep members abreast of our news and activities. We also make use of our Facebook Group “La Salle Old Boys’ Ties” to dispatch OBA news and connect with old boys instantly, allowing users to share Lasallian news too. Last but not least, I created a couple of Whatsapp groups with class coordinators of different years from 1956 to 2013 and Overseas Chapters to promote fraternity and exchange views on Lasallian issues.

He devoted most of his time to public affairs. He was the Chairman of the Urban Council and a member of the Legislative Council. Also, he is the founder of the Hong Kong Civic Association. Mr. Hilton Cheong-Leen, a man whose La Salle Spirit never diminishes, is certainly a distinguished old boy of La Salle.

Mr. Hilton Cheong-Leen, an old boy with true La Salle Spirit who devoted most of his time to serving the public, had been the Chairman of the Urban Council and a member of the Legislative Council. His outstanding achievements had earned him an CBE and a JP.

Mr. Cheong-Leen's first association with La Salle College was way back to the mid 30's when he returned from South America. He was in the same matriculation class with Mr. A de O. Sales, and afterwards he spent two years in commercial studies. When being asked about his impression of the students of his time, Mr. Cheong-Leen said that the Lasallians were traditionally very united. They often maintained good relationships with each other even after they had left the school. For instance, he and Mr. A. de O. Sales were contemporaries in La Salle and afterwards they had been working together in the LSCOPA and the Urban Council for many years. 'Of course, we are still good friends now,' he said.

Having left La Salle, Mr. Cheong-Leen was actively involved in the affairs of the LSCOPA. He had been the President of the Association from 1954 to 1957. 'At that time, we had a close relationship with the Old Boys' Association of St. Joseph's College. We used to organize many joint functions with them. Furthermore, we also had a good relationship with the old boys as well as the de La Salle Brothers. We were all dedicated to the Association,' he said. On the other hand, Mr. Cheong-Leen also had a good connection with the old boys living overseas. 'I remember many years ago when I paid a visit to Canada, I had a meeting with a group of old boys there. I was really impressed by their solidarity. I therefore encouraged them to set up an overseas chapter of the LSCOPA. Now, such organizations have been widely established in many cities in North America,' he explained. Talking about the future of the LSCOPA, he suggested seminars to be held for the old boys to take part so as to share their ideas and knowledge with each other. 'It is indeed worth joining the LSCOPA. I hope current students will all join the Association when they leave La Salle,' he continued.

Mr. Cheong-Leen spent much of his time on serving the public. Throughout his 34 years of service in the Urban Council, he has witnessed a vast improvement in the urban services and recreational facilities. Besides, he has also done a good job in the promotion of cultural activities and facilities in Hong Kong. 'More than ten years ago, the Urban Council drafted a proposal for the construction of a Science Museum in Hong Kong. Now, we are glad to see our idea indeed come true!' he said. Apart from these, Mr. Cheong-Leen had been a member of the Legislative Council and of the Housing Authority for 9 years and 22 years respectively. With the aim of serving the public, especially the low-income group, he showed deep concerns for their living environment and transportation facilities. Having noticed some amelioration in the people's living conditions, he said that it was worth taking part in those actions and he was very happy at what was accomplished.

In our conversation, Mr. Cheong-Leen often drew our attention to the La Salle Spirit, something which is clearly reflected by our school song. 'We must have true La Salle Spirit, that is, to have courage and perseverance as manifested in our school song. We must not neglect these whenever we do anything,' he said. 'La Salle is always something more; we should also develop a sense of responsibility to our society besides courage. We should make use of any opportunity given to serve the public and our society,' he added with confidence. Moreover, having noticed the great contribution done by the old boys to the society of Hong Kong, Mr. Cheong-Leen gave us an interpretation of the status of La Salle. 'Some old boys have outstanding achievements in many different fields. For instance, Mr. Michael Sze and Mr. Nicholas Ng held important posts in the government while Mr. Sales was the first unofficial Chairman of the Urban Council not to mention his outstanding role in sports development. And of course our Financial Secretary, Hon John Tsang who is also the school's honorary fencing master. I think current students should recognize them as good examples of serving the public. That is why I believe that La Salle students play an important role in the society of Hong Kong. Therefore, I am confident to say that La Salle is one of the best schools here and that we should have a sense of pride in being a student of La Salle,' he said proudly.

Although being half-retired, Mr. Cheong-Leen is still active as Life President of the Hong Kong Civic Association in training new blood to serve the community. 'But I shall be spending more time enjoying family life' he said. Talking about his attitude towards the future of Hong Kong, Mr. Cheong-Leen said he was very optimistic about the matter. 'Society is changing every day. What we need to do is to work together to maintain our styles of living and most importantly, to

further develop Hong Kong and make it prosperous. I believe a prosperous Hong Kong will certainly act as a linkage between China and the rest of the world. As a result, we must first keep our economy stable before we can form a valuable linkage,' he explained. However, we are told not to proceed too rapidly. Instead we should improve our society using a moderate pace. At the same time, Mr. Cheong-Leen reiterated that the prerequisite for any development in Hong Kong is freedom. He said that we must be given the freedom of choice and the freedom to express our ideas before we can make any further development. Therefore, he agreed that freedom is an important element in keeping the stability and prosperity of Hong Kong and that we should strive for it together.

Finally, Mr. Cheong-Leen gave us some useful advice saying, 'We should have confidence in our society and we should be optimistic about the present and future situation. Remember, we must uphold our strong La Salle Spirit not only to fight for our own values but also for the prestige of Hong Kong. I am sure with our rich experience and knowledge and the determination to excel, Hong Kong shall continue to be one of the most famous cities in the world.'

MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

I am very much honoured to be given the opportunity to serve as the Principal of La Salle College. Having served in La Salle for more than 30 years has enabled me to think deeply about the Lasallian spirit of Faith, Service and Community and internalize it in my thinking and beliefs.

I graduated from the University of Hong Kong in 1984 and joined La Salle in the same year. I majored in Chinese History in my undergraduate studies. At the time when I graduated, there was an opening in La Salle for a Chinese Language and Chinese History teacher. Since I wanted to be a teacher, I applied for the post. Luckily, I was employed by Brother Alphonsus Chee and started to serve here. In the first few years, my teaching duties were mainly F4-5 Chinese Language and F3-5 Chinese History. And after that, as the Education Department introduced Putonghua into the formal curriculum, I also started teaching that subject. I was promoted to be the Panel Head of Chinese (Senior Forms) in 1995 and then Vice Principal in 2006.

During the years of service here, I cannot agree more with the mission statement of our school that La Salle College is committed to providing a high quality human and Christian education to our students. It embraces the notion that students here at La Salle can fully realise their potential and can achieve excellence in all things, including academic studies, sports and cultural activities. To excel oneself is an expression of determination, perseverance, hard work, planning, etc. of one's attributes which students are expected to nurture and develop. On top of that, our school also emphasizes the importance of value education. To nurture the spirit of service is another educational aim in our school. Lasallians are meant for others. We must not forget that when St John Baptist de La Salle founded the Christian Brothers, the aim was to serve those poor children that had no chance to attend school. So, it is always our intention to serve the last, the lost and the least. We do expect our students to reciprocate what they have received from society to those who are in need.

Many old boys are very active in serving the school even long after they graduated. This is a true reflection of the spirit of serving. Also, La Salle students and old boys have a special bond with the school. I think this is what the spirit of community is. To associate and work zealously together toward a common good is an atmosphere we cherish at school. La Salle is truly something more.

Recently, I was interviewed by some students and they asked me what my plans are and what my expectations of La Salle students will be. La Salle is a well established school and everything is on track and runs well. I would rather look more deeply into the details of the plans and how they would be implemented. For example, in the promotion of eLearning at school, my focus apart from the hardware, will be on how the use of eLearning tools changes the pedagogy of teachers so that there is more interaction in class which could enhance learning. Another example will be the exchange programmes. We have more and more exchange programmes that could enhance student learning. Apart from providing more and more opportunities to students, I would look at how we can make the programmes help the participants to reflect and apply what they have learnt in class in real-life situations. These are the things I would like to concentrate on at this moment.

It is the aim of the school to nurture our students to be decent Lasallian gentlemen with a healthy body and mind, be responsible, compassionate, ready to serve others with a caring attitude and most important of all cherishing the Lasallian spirit of Faith, Service and Community. I truly believe that our students will show all these character traits when they graduate from Form Six.

Before entering the courts, the old boys introduced the fundamentals of the judiciary system in HK and backgrounds of different trials of the day. After seeing the trials, there was a debriefing of what happened in the courts and the parties present. We then had the opportunity to meet with old boy judges Patrick Li and David Lok to learn about their challenging legal career. They also shared their views on legal issues like human rights, freedom of speech and public concerns on legal

judgements and discussed with the students on questions raised. Judge Li advised us to understand the reasons behind a judgment rather than forming an impression simply based on the case's end result (guilty or not guilty).

In the afternoon, 15 students visited an investment bank, AMTD 尚乘, in Central. They learned about the many different financing roles of ibanks and their services provided for corporate clients who want to raise funds for business developments; Through a case study of two newly listed companies, they gained in-depth knowledge of IPO (initial public offering) fund raising deals. Old boys Mark and William also shared their vibrant career life as an investment banker. Students are advised to have a broader mind set in considering future studies and career as well as to brush up their Putonghua skills which is essential in the financial field.

There were over 600 men and women athletes representing over 10 athletics clubs in the HK Masters. The athletes were divided into age groups every 5 years, such as Grade A is from age 35 to 39, Grade B is age 40 to 44 and Grade C is 45 to 49 etc..... The events were 100m, 400m, 800m, 3000m walk, 5km, High Jump, Long Jump, Discus, Shot Putt, Javelin, 4x100m and 4x400m relay. The competition started at 8am with 400m as the first event and concluded around 7pm with 4x100m relay.



Our ex-Sports Masters Mr. TP Cheung competed in the HK Masters for the second year. He ran a respectable 36.87 seconds in the Grade H 100m. Our most senior Old Boy athlete Norman Ng (51) has won two Gold medals in the Grade K 800m and javelin, well done TP and Norman!

RIP “CLEVER BOY” MR. CHIU SIU LAI (41)



Mr. Chiu Siu Lai was born in Hong Kong in February 1921. After spending some time living in Mainland China, he returned to HK in early 1930s, and entered Class 7 (equivalent to Primary 6) of La Salle College in 1935. Mr. Chiu was a gifted student, and the 1937 School Speech Day programme testified Mr. Chiu in winning the third place class prize in Class 5C!

In a 2011 interview, the usually reserved Mr. Chiu fondly recalled a story. In class, Bro. Cassian was trying in vain to solve a difficult mathematical problem. At his wit's end, and feeling a little embarrassed, Bro. Cassian turned round and asked if anyone could solve the problem. After a few seconds of uneasy silence, Mr. Chiu raised his hand, walked up to the blackboard, took a piece of chalk, and methodically tackled the problem. Not only did Mr. Chiu earn the nickname “Clever Boy” from Bro. Cassian because of this incident, his mathematical brilliance etched a deep impression in Bro. Cassian's mind.

Mr. Chiu graduated from La Salle College, and he saw his vocation in teaching. So in 1941, he embarked on a teacher training course at the then newly established Northcote College of Education. Unfortunately, war broke out in December 1941. During the 18 days of hostilities, the twenty year-old served as an air raid warden on Hong Kong Island, helping to maintain law and order at air raid shelters. Mr. Chiu survived the fighting unscathed, and resumed his teacher training at the early stage of the Japanese occupation. Not long after though, Mr. Chiu made his way to Free China. Given his English Language proficiency, he joined the Chinese Army as an interpreter and was assigned to liaise between the US army advisors and their Chinese counterparts until the end of the war.

During the war, Mr. Chiu's father passed away, and as the eldest child, he took up the fatherly responsibilities of the family to care for his mother, younger brother and sister. After the surrender of the Japanese, Mr. Chiu returned to Hong Kong, but without a job. One day in 1946, Mr. Chiu ran into his former teacher, Bro. Cassian, who had then returned to HK to become Principal of the reopened LSC. Bro. Cassian immediately recognized his bright student, and called out “Clever Boy!”. This reunion landed Mr. Chiu an appointment of Mr. Chiu to his calling as a teacher, back at his alma mater, a role which he devotedly held on for some 40 years.

Mr. Chiu married in 1952, and was blessed with a son and daughter. He taught many different subjects in LSC, and offered his whole forty year career to educating La Salle boys. After his retirement in 1986, he later immigrated to Canada in 1997, and spent time between Hong Kong and Toronto. Whether in Canada or HK, Mr. Chiu remained very active and very independent, and would regularly show up at old boys' events, insisting on making his way to and from the events via public transport, which was no easy feat for a 80 year old in Canada. On being offered a ride by old boys, Mr. Chiu would firmly decline it, saying if the old boys insisted to drive him, he won't show up next time!



Mr. Chiu enjoyed relatively good health into his 90s. He passed away peacefully in early September 2016 at the ripe age of 95.

May God bless the soul of Mr. Chiu, who will forever be a beloved fatherly teacher of generations of Lasallians.
